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Dear Saint Agnes Alumni, Families, and Friends,

For the past 135 years, Saint Agnes School has been forming Catholic hearts and minds in faith, reason, and virtue. When I think of 135 years, I find it difficult to comprehend that passage of time; our world has seen numerous examples of great technological advancement, peace, and prosperity, as well as the always present reminders of original sin in the form of world wars, immorality, and corruption. What has remained constant over this course of time is the reality and saving Truth of Jesus Christ–fully present in the Catholic Church—and, particularly, in the beautiful light that is Saint Agnes School which, for 135 years, has been planted in the heart of St. Paul's Frogtown.

allowing us to thrive when so many other schools are facing teaching shortages, declining enrollment, and an uncertain future. Waitlists are now our reality in several key entry-point grades—and for good reason. Our student culture is the strongest I have seen since I began as Headmaster eight years ago. Our classical liberal arts curriculum continues to draw mission-fit families and students from across

the Twin Cities metropolitan area—85 zip codes, to be exact. Student involvement has increased across all our athletic teams and activities. We now have 11 Aggie alumni who have returned as faculty and staff members, and over 20 alumni coaching our athletic teams—a few of whom you will read about in these pages.

As you journey through the decades with us in these Archives, I ask that you consider your own time in these hallowed halls and reflect on how God used Saint Agnes School to help form who you are today. Who were the teachers that most impacted you? What memories hold a special place in your heart? Which friendships have lasted, and which could use refreshing?

The future challenge for us at Saint Agnes School is substantial: to continue to rely on the theological virtues and Divine Providence to inform how we grow responsibly and in accordance with God's will. And so, I would like to pose a final question to you: how might you support our mission in a new, meaningful way? However you answer that question, we ask for your continued prayers as we seek those of Saint Agnes herself-that we might be guided by the Holy Spirit to follow the example of Christ, ever-striving to accomplish the plan of our Heavenly Father for the next 135 years at this wonderful school.

Lois (Asher) Lotzer, Odelia (Soler) Conlin '45, & Tom Poeschl '46

The grade school opened in September of 1888 with 160 children under the tutelage of four School Sisters of Notre Dame. Through the years the school expanded to a "commercial class", then a 2-year high school, and, in 1940, a new 4-year school opened (current Gruden Hall) with bowling alleys in the basement to help pay off the debt. It was the first co-ed high school in the Archdiocese.

Lois (Asher) Lotzer, Odelia (Soler) Conlin '45, and Tom Poeschl '46 sat down with us to reminisce about the new high school and life in the mid-40s.

Lois (Asher) Lotzer lived in Hastings, the oldest of seven children and daughter of a beekeeper. Through the recommendation of an aunt who lived nearby, her parents enrolled Lois at Saint Agnes and sent her to live with her aunt her freshman year. She returned to the family home in the summers and the following two school years she lived with two different families. She ran errands, did housecleaning, and performed other household duties in exchange for room and board and a stipend of \$5 a week for tuition. With tuition set at \$30 a year for parishioners and \$40 for non-parishioners, Lois did quite well!

She recalls the many friendships she made, and the variety of classes offered. She enjoyed typing class, though she wasn't very good at it, and the all-girl secretarial class. A favorite memory is walking up the block during lunch to buy a Bismarck. After graduating in 1945, she took a few classes

at the University of MN and worked parttime at Armor Creamery, putting a little money away for later. That—and a later job at West Publishing—proved beneficial, for when her husband passed away at an early age, she used that money to raise their six children on her own. Lois is a member of St. Mark's parish and enjoys speaking city. Friendships were very important to Odelia. It was the start of WWII and news of the war was everywhere - at school, at the movies, and on the radio. It made you a little anxious and made you appreciate your friends. She remembers the dances and the big bands, the bowling alley in the basement, and the school performing Gilbert & Sullivan's *H.M.S. Pinafore*. Such fun they had.

Her sharp memory also recalled many teachers and classes. She regrets not being able to take a foreign language; she remembers being told there were not enough students for German, and her brother talked her out of taking Latin. Besides the wonderful nuns, she recalls the gym teacher. Miss Baudette, as being

with parishioners whose children attend Saint Agnes. She says it's easy to identify Saint Agnes students because they are kind, respectful, and polite. She admires how the school has grown and is impressed that today's students have the same formation she did so many years ago.

Odelia (Soler) Conlin was also a member of the Class of 1945. An East-Sider who attended St. John's grammar school, she loved making new friends in high school with children from all over the

exceptionally kind and remembers going across the street into what is now the parking lot and playing ball. Odelia also remembers classmate Pat Collins, who was a very good female athlete. During gym class, when teams were being chosen, Odelia usually was last, as she wasn't very good at the games. Pat was always so kind in picking her and always made her feel valued. Perhaps it was her kind heart that attracted Pat to the sisterhood, as she later became known as Sr. Mary Donald.

She also fondly remembers Fr. Gruden and his Dalmatian dog. She even took a photo of the two of them and still has it. Father Gruden would come into school to hand out report cards. A strict and staunch German, the kids were a bit afraid of him but Odelia, who had gotten a D in history, remembers him being so gentle with her when handing her the report card and saying, "Work harder next time," in a soft voice.

Tom Poeschl graduated in 1946. One of five siblings, he is a 13-year Aggie (as well

as are his three children). Tom loved sports, and football and baseball were his favorites. But he also played basketball because as he remembers, "We were a new school. If you were a boy, you played on the team."

Though Tom remembers scoring two points for the opposing team in a 0-2 loss in football, and not winning many games, his name appears in numerous St. Paul Pioneer Press articles as a major player on the team. Baseball, on the other hand, was more successful as Saint Agnes won the title by beating Cretin. That's a big win for the Aggies!

A favorite teacher for Tom, and for many, was Sr. M. Adrienne, who taught Chemistry and Physics. Sister explained to them the science behind the nuclear bomb before it was dropped on Japan in 1945, just after graduation. He remembers that some of the boys in the class left early to enlist in the war. He waited until after graduation and joined the Army on the GI Bill. At this point in the war, there wasn't much to do so he says he pretty much just played baseball and football. He continued his playing career after the service and, with mostly fellow Aggies, was a member of the CAA Senior Parish Championship baseball team.

All three alumni felt very fortunate to have had the opportunity to attend the new Saint Agnes High School and to be part of its history. They appreciate the education they received from the Sisters-who were strict, but ran the school well-and they are grateful for the faith and values that were instilled along the way. They cherish the friends they made and the foundation they received that has proved so valuable in their formation. They have kept an eye on Saint Agnes throughout the decades and are thrilled to see the growth, stability, and success the school has been experiencing as well as the quality of students who are graduating. What a blessing to be able to speak with alumni from nearly 80 years ago!

Chris Pierce '98

Chris Grew up in Saint Paul and competed on multiple youth sports teams. While playing in the Mariucci inner-city youth hockey program, his grandmother became acquainted with families whose children attended Saint Agnes. She felt they were close-knit families, going in the right direction, and felt that Saint Agnes may be a fitting place for Chris. She was impressed with the values and morals these

families portrayed. After a school tour and a trip on a fan bus to watch the '94 basketball team on the road to the State tournament, Chris knew it was for him. The atmosphere and the people sold him, and he went home and told his grandma of his experience. The decision was made.

Chris played four years of basketball and baseball and was a member of the first Saint Agnes baseball team to compete at the State Tournament, but, after the recent State Championship, basketball was everything! Gyms were packed with fans, community members would seek you out, and there was a lot of attention. He loved it.

He was especially fond of his teachers. Ms. Ann Laird, his freshman religion teacher, was so understanding and instilled values. Though Chris wasn't Catholic, he learned to understand the Catholic faith. When studying the Crusades, Chris asked question after question. Ms. Laird pulled him aside and enthusiastically said, "You're learning!"

Mr. Silvia was so full of life—and jokes. Mr. Hoemke had the world's greatest beard!
But two teachers who played a major role in who he is today were Mr. Mike Fitzgerald

and Mr. Tom Flood. In Mr. Fitz's English class, he found a love for reading...and dry humor; he still uses Mr. Fitz's one-liners. Mr. Flood was an authoritative figure. Chris shared that, "He clearly drew a line that said, 'I'm here to care for you, I'm here to make sure you develop into a young man of God.' His mission and his goals are

evident in the community today. Many of the guys I went to school with attribute their success to people like Coach Flood. They give back to the community because of the values learned at Saint Agnes."


After high school, Chris went to a private college in Alabama, and it seemed that everything that was presented there he had already learned at Saint Agnes. Seeing what Saint Agnes is today, he remarked,

"Today's scholars are more than prepared when they leave—spiritually, academically, and athletically. Saint Agnes is doing a wonderful job."

Five years ago, Chris had the opportunity to return as Assistant Boys Basketball Coach. He began building relationships with the younger players and became head coach last year, continuing to build relationships and be a role model for young men, just as those who had done the same for him.



In his final thoughts, Chris remarks, "Being able to come back and coach at a place that has been so good to me, that's allowed me to move on and become a teacher...this is the place to be! It has nothing to do with winning and losing. You're going to be around a bunch of hardworking people who want to improve in their everyday lives, in whatever they are doing. That's why I'm here. That's why I love it here. I am blessed to be part of this community and to have graduated from Saint Agnes."

Peter and Natalia started dating a couple years after high school, married in 2018, and are now the proud parents of three children. Peter returned to Saint Agnes this past fall as an Upper School Mathematics teacher. We sat down with Peter and Natalia to reminisce.

Q: How did you come to be an Aggie?

Natalia: I grew up in Saint Louis Park, and after attending my local Catholic grade school, I was considering going to the public high school in the area. An uncle who I am close to pushed for me to consider Catholic high schools, and, after touring several, we both liked Saint Agnes. Being that I lived a bit away, I would carpool with a grade school friend's mother, who traveled to St. Paul for work.

Peter: I am the youngest of seven, so I followed in my siblings' footsteps. As more of my siblings enrolled at Saint Agnes, my parents transferred us over at an earlier time. I entered in Grade 5.

Q: Who were the teachers who had an influence on you?

Peter: Mr. Firchow was my math teacher for three of my four years. He is the reason I chose to become a math teacher, myself. He

met you where you were and made you feel heard. Even students who hated math enjoyed his class. I felt I could talk to him about anything. I still keep in touch with him.

Natalia: I have a collection of teachers, and I'm not even sure if I took any of the classes they taught. I often had lots of time after school waiting for a ride so I would pop around to teachers in their classrooms to talk. I spent so much time in the rooms of Mr. Dahdah, Ms. Larson, and Mr. Whalen. It was so cool to get to know them outside a subject area. They would sit down and talk about finer points and controversial subjects, and I felt seen and treated respectfully. I remember being blown away that people can be practicing Catholics and still be cool and funny and have interests-like music-that are similar to mine, yet they understand all this other stuff and it makes sense to them. It's so nice to have Peter working here now because I can still see them often.

Q: What were some fun favorite memories?



Peter: I played soccer for four years and our senior year we were seeded #12 in playoffs, pitted against #5 South St. Paul. They came to the game with dyed hair, all ready for their playoff run, and we beat them. That's the first time we got beyond round one of playoffs. I also enjoyed being on the musical stage crew and being a fan for the 2012 Baseball State Championship. I had many good friends on the team. Favorite notables also include Mrs. Noble's supply of 25 cent snacks in study hall, the Pro-Life Club, art classes in the basement of Bandas that had no natural light, and sharing gym space with the musical all spring.

Natalia: I tried a bit of volleyball, a bit of cheer, but the spring musical would have to be the highlight. I had always loved musicals and wanted to be involved, but living so far away would have been too hard. My senior year I figured, "I'll just see what it is and maybe I can work it out!" When I found out it was "High School Musical" it



was like a dream come true. I loved that musical and dreamed of being Gabrielle since I was ten. I auditioned and would have been happy with any small part, but when I got the lead, I was shocked, excited, and nervous all at the same time.

Q: What do you appreciate about Saint Agnes?

Natalia: Saint Agnes is such a unique experience. At the time I was just going to school, but looking back now it really was amazing. We made so many connections. It sounds corny, but it really is like family. We had access to adults who were genuinely cool and funny and on fire for their faith. We had monthly adoration and confession right here. As a young mom, I have so much more appreciation for how easily accessible it was. With the history of the school, I feel like we are part of something bigger.

Peter: Though we weren't dating in high school, I did meet my wife at Saint Agnes, my siblings and I all went here, now my nieces and nephews are attending. It's a family affair. We see old teachers at Mass or in the community. We keep in close touch with the friends we went to school with. For such a small school, I am amazed at how many people have a connection to Saint Agnes. There are so many constant reminders that bring us back to where it all came together.

"I was very, very fortunate to be able to attend Saint Agnes. It's one of the best things that ever happened to me. Bottom line, they did it right here. I will go to my grave loving Saint Agnes." These were the opening sentiments of Ted Steichen, Class of 1952.

Ted grew up in Frogtown and was a 12year Aggie. "Guess they felt I didn't need kindergarten," he jokes. His father owned a grocery store on Rondo Street, and he grew up learning to respect people from all walks of life. He first credits his parents,



then the nuns and coach Chuck Schuman for instilling in him a strong sense of right and wrong. "I learned that right is right and wrong is wrong. And if it's wrong, you gotta fix it." When asked about his teachers, Ted responded, "I have a lot of respect for the

nuns. We all need discipline, and they may have had rulers in their pockets, but they were so very patient as well. I was sick my senior year and needed to stay after school to catch up and I am so grateful for the help I received from them. They are saints to put up with the kids and I am so glad to see nuns back at Saint Agnes. They are the best."

After graduation, Ted went to college for a couple of years, then into the service. Afterward, he went into business with his father. They had a general merchandise store on University Avenue, then switched to sporting goods in the late 1950s. After arson destroyed the University Avenue Steichens' Sporting Goods store, they moved to Roseville and sold

the business in 1999. The family grocery business, however, continues to this day. For 96 years, the Steichens have operated a grocery store in the Commissary building at the Minnesota State Fair. Ted's son, Jim, currently runs the store.

Ted and Pat, his lovely wife of 64 years, "She's going straight to heaven!" Ted

interjects, have three children, all of whom graduated from Saint Agnes. "I saw what it did for me and wanted the same for my kids. There are so many tangibles, so many things they do right. There is no better school."

Summarizing the role Saint Agnes played in his life, Ted concludes, "Surround yourself with good people, and good things happen. This was the advice I received from my father, and I believe it to be true. I met so many good people at Saint Agnes. Mix together the nuns, academics, and sports, and it comes out pretty good! What I see at Saint Agnes right now reminds me a lot of when

I went here. You have the players in place who are very good at what they do, and you are doing it right. Word gets around. The alumni are very proud of Saint Agnes. I consider myself blessed to be part of it."





Jolene (Rosenthal) Schmitz '91

Jolene is yet another alumna who has returned home to Saint Agnes. Right after college in the late 1990's, she taught high school math and science at Saint Agnes, and she is back again not only with her family (four children currently attend) but also professionally, joining our staff as one of our guidance counselors. During her high school years as an Aggie, Jolene was a very active and involved student, and we sat down with her to hear more about her experience as an Aggie and what ultimately brought her back home.

Q: Where did you grow up, and how did you end up going to school at Saint Agnes?

Jolene: Como Park. My parents went to a talk Monsignor Schuler was giving. Monsignor Schuler said that you want to send your child to a school that best represents what your family represents, so my dad chose to withdraw my oldest brother from a certain school that we shall not name and send us all to Saint Agnes High School.

Q: How did you get to school everyday?

Jolene: We took the bus; we got the bus passes from Ercolani! We took the bus to the mall, we took the bus to school, it was very normal. Families had one car. It was normal.

Q: No parents on the bus?

Jolene: Never.

Q: Were you taught by any religious sisters?

Jolene: Sr. Celine was the librarian, and she taught us freshman year religion.



Everybody will know her name—she was just a sweetheart.

Q: Were there any influential teachers you had?

Jolene: Mr. Pepper taught me how to say, "Yes," and not, "Yeah." But I think as a whole I loved all the teachers. Mrs. Williams taught chemistry and physics she was real, she was calm, and it was who she was. Those are hard subjects, but she was very patient with us. I think it was the (positive) fault of my wonderful teachers Ms. Rudolph and Mrs. Williams that I became a math major.

Q: Were there any particularly memorable games or activities that stick out in your memory?

Jolene: Our senior class...when I go down the list, I have memories with each person.

Q: What led you back to Saint Agnes?

Jolene: I'm surprised I'm here. I went to school in Ohio and never looked back. I was done-I felt like a finished product. I took that spirit of Saint Agnes and got super involved and met a gazillion people. It propelled me into taking advantage of opportunities. I would say it was the hand of God. My youngest was in preschool so I went back to grad school to get a counseling degree, was an active therapist, was looking for a job on the Archdiocesan website for one of my clients, and this counselor job here was open. By then I had tasted how crazy being a working mom was, and I was like, "Oh, my kids are here and this could really simplify my life." Even when I taught here in 1996-98, I went to have a meeting with Monsignor Schuler. I was getting him to write a letter of recommendation for me to do this overseas mission program and he was like, "Well we actually have a job for you right here to be a missionary." Both experiences have been really fun.



od continues to smile on our PreK-12th grade school in the Frogtown neighborhood of St. Paul. He wants this school to exist and He continues to send us the right employees and families who together combine their efforts to not only survive but thrive in this ever changing world.

We think it's safe to say that Saint Agnes has hit a Golden Age. Over a little more than a decade all metrics continue to point towards positive growth for our school. The word is out that Saint Agnes School continues to be an excellent institution for families to send their children to be educated in the Catholic faith through a very strong liberal arts/classical approach.

This is our 16th consecutive year of enrollment growth. More families continue

to find us from all over the Twin Cities metro area. And once they come, they don't leave. The attrition rate of our students has fallen to an incredibly low number of 4.5%, a solid indicator that our families are happy with their experience. Our students are staying and graduating. Now that we have a preschool, we could see the advent of 14 and 15-year Aggies!

We have full classes and wait lists for PreK, Kindergarten, 2nd, 5th, 6th, 9th, and 10th grades. If the data persists on its current trajectory our high school will be practically full next year. After this past enrollment deadline, we had 17 students on our waiting list for 9th grade. We continue to attract students from 54 parishes and 17 schools around the metro area.

Our families continue to make difficult sacrifices to be here as well. The average commute is 25 minutes. Most families pass multiple schools on their drive into Frogtown. It seems apparent that they agree the drive time is well worth the result. A mom said to me the other day, "I'm willing to lose an extra half an hour of sleep in the morning to get to Saint Agnes so I can sleep easy at night knowing my children are safe and growing in their faith." Well said!

Our faculty and staff are incredible and are staying for longer tenures. The religious

representation on campus has also grown. Many of you know the Dominican Sisters, Mary Mother of the Eucharist, joined us five years ago. We couldn't be happier with their presence. Additionally, we've been blessed with two priests from the religious order, Pro Ecclesia Sancta, housed at the Church of Saint Mark, who minister to the spiritual needs of our students on campus, at Holy Mass, and in the confessional, as well as managing a spiritual counseling office.

This spate of great news continues to humble us as we realize that no one human is responsible for this continued path of excellence. We owe it all to Him as we pray for success in the future and seek His will. We ask for the continued support of our friends, families, and community at large, and prayers that not ours, but His will be done.



FOOTBALL

Saint Agnes football finished the season 8-2. After opening the season with a loss to Spectrum the team rebounded with 8 consecutive wins before losing to Norwood-Young America in the Section 4AA Semifinals.

The Aggies earned another Twins Cities Blue District Championship finishing 5-1 in district play and running the table on District postseason awards.

Aidan Walsh and Adam Hernandez were district offensive and defensive MVP's respectively. Cadman Foley and Henry Tibesar were district offensive and defensive linemen of the year. Coach Sam Thompson was unanimously voted District Coach of the Year.

Earning All-District honors were Walsh, Hernandez, Tibesar, Dominic Adkins, Cegan Flood, Landen Mickelson and Andrew Chlebeck. Honorable mention honors went to Foley, Joseph Skidmore, Tysan Nguyen and Raphael Uhlenkott.

A new tradition began this year with the Dale Street Trophy. This trophy will be awarded to the winner of the annual Saint Agnes vs. Concordia game. In the inaugural matchup, the Aggies defeated Concordia Academy 24-13 to capture the first-ever Battle for Dale Street Trophy.





BOYS AND GIRLS CROSS COUNTRY

The Saint Agnes Boys Cross Country team wrapped up a strong season placing 5th at the Section 4A Meet. The boys were led by Henry Kaardal who finished 11th overall with a time of 17:05, narrowly missing out on becoming only the second Aggie runner in recent history to qualify for state. The Top 5 runners - Kaardal, Jonah Honerman (21st, 17:33), Greg Maloney (24th, 17:34), Ezra Kuznia (28th, 17:50), and Joseph Draganowski (40th, 18:12) - now own 5 of the Top 8 times in school history.

The Aggie Girls Cross Country team also wrapped up their season finishing 9th at the Section 4A Meet. The girls had a strong pack with Sarah Lehnen (32nd, 22:16), Jane Kuwata (43rd, 22:38), Klara Ferdinandt (47th, 22:54), and Cecilia Grant (51st, 23:05) finishing within a minute of one another. Julia Ferdinandt (63rd, 23:50) finished her senior season by rounding out the top 5 with an excellent showing.



BOYS SOCCER

The Boys Soccer Team continues to grow. This year they finished 11-5-1 overall and 5-2-1 in Skyline Conference play, recording their best season since 1996.

Named to the All-Conference Team were Jacob McLaughlin, Winner Winant, Paul Plasch, and Casey Lynn. Honorable mentions were Sean Brennan, Josh Walter, and Luke Honerman.

Isabelle Most and Elizabeth LeVesseur were selected All-Conference, while Faustina Adkins, Danielle Spencer, and Alyssa McLaughlin were named honorable mentions.

VOLLEYBALL

Despite being in one of the toughest conferences and sections for volleyball, the Aggies finished 9-13 overall and 2-5 in conference play. They provided many thrilling games throughout the season, keeping fans on the edge of their seats and Bandas Gymnasium bumping with energy.

Senior Maria DiPietro was selected to the All-Conference Team while seniors Lucia Damm and Annika Odenbrett brought home honorable mention honors.





In Spring 2001, the Saint Agnes Baseball Team was on a winning streak. They had won 14 of their last 15 games and advanced through the playoffs to face Sleepy Eye-St. Mary's in the state championship. With an 18-7 record, they were now facing a team with a 25-1 record. Beating the odds and defeating Goliath, the Aggies were victorious by a score of 16-6-thereby capturing the 2001 Class A State Baseball Championship.

In September, Saint Agnes School inducted the entire team into our Athletic Hall of Fame. Many members of the 2001 State Championship Baseball Team returned to campus to accept their awards and share memories from an amazing season.

Both Head Coach Ryan Collins and Assistant Coach Greg Hoemke acknowledged the players' commitment to the team, their work ethic throughout the entire season, and their ability to always have fun. Greg Hoemke credited the team's "refusing to lose" spirit as the reason he knew that squad was going to be good.



Team captain Paul Barrett recounted, "We didn't know how good we were, but Coach Collo knew. He never put the pressure on us to feel like we were that good. There was one practice when we were in Florida where things were not going well. Coach pulled us all off the field. We were sitting along third base line and he says, 'This team could be really special.' He knew what we had, but we were too young to know it—we were just happy to be in Florida."



A favorite memory of the season for Barrett was when Saint Agnes played Hastings. "I don't know how Coach Collins got that game on the schedule," he remembered, "Why would Hastings agree to play us? We were little Saint Agnes – a Class A team! Not only were they a really good team in the 3A big school bracket, but they had won the state championship two years earlier. They were the big school state champions, and we went down there and just dominated them."

This team wasn't only loaded on the field, but also on the bench. Fellow captain Adam Flaherty recalled the depth and talent of the team and how even those teammates who





didn't see a lot of playing time contributed to the successes of the 2001 season. "Anyone in that lineup would have performed positively in some aspect or at some position in the season," he said, "With the guys we had, we had confidence in anyone who was in the batter's box."

The 2001 State Champion Aggie Baseball Team wasn't special just because of a talented few, but because of the culture of the team, the leadership of coaches and teammates, and the love of the game. Fittingly, then, we are proud to have the entire team enshrined in our Athletic Hall of Fame forever.

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Catechesis Through Sacred Art: Vestments

ohs!" and "Aahs!" readily come from our young students, as well as the seasoned high school altar servers, when they see a particularly beautiful liturgical vestment. The artistic theme or image which is depicted on the vestments and exquisite craftsmanship, especially the fine needle work, are wonders to behold. They are superb tools for catechesis. Both at Holy Mass and during visits to the sacristy, our students have long had the opportunity to learn more about their faith through our liturgical vestments.

The chasuble worn by the priest during Holy Mass is shaped like the kind of poncho a shepherd would wear. Jesus Christ is the Good Shepherd. The chasuble is meant to remind us that at Mass Jesus is guiding His flock with His truth and feeding them from His very Body and Blood.

When the Feast of St. Martin has fallen on a school Mass day, usually Thursdays, I have told the students about how the Roman soldier, Martin, encountered an under-dressed and cold beggar. Martin took his cape and cut it in half, giving one piece of it to the poor man. Later Martin discovered in a vision that it was really Jesus in disguise. After Martin became a Bishop of Tours, a small church was built to hold the surviving half of Martin's



cape. The little building was named after the "little cape", or in French, "chapelle". This is where we get our word for small churches, chapels. The students are always amazed to discover the origin of the word chapel!

The colors of vestments also teach! Every liturgical season and Feast Day has an assigned color for the vestments to be worn. Each color has its own meaning. Red-worn on Pentecost, Palm Sunday, Good Friday and the Feast of Martyrs-signifies the fire of the Holy Spirit and the Blood of Christ and Martyrs. Green-worn on Sundays and weekdays of Ordinary Time, symbolizes

> that our spiritual lives should always be verdant, i.e., growing. Purple—worn during Advent and Lent, signify the penance, waiting and self-denial. Rose-worn only on two days, the Third Sunday of Advent

(Gaudete Sunday) and the Fourth Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday)—indicates that the time of waiting or penance is almost over and that either Christmas or Easter is almost here! White-worn for Christmas, Easter, Holy Thursday, Solemnities, Feasts of our Lady, and non-martyr Saints—connotes celebration and purity. Black is worn for All Souls Day and at some funerals; it carries with it the meaning of sorrow and death.

If you are interested in learning more about the truth, goodness, and beauty that is present in the liturgical celebrations of our parish and school, I encourage you to consider searching for the Church of Saint Agnes or The Sacristy on YouTube, and subscribing to catch up on all of the videos that we have produced so far, as well as to look forward to forthcoming videos in the series.


